

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EDITORIAL

Tribute to the fallen Inclusive ALE Champion

Writing to pay tribute to **Fred Lukabwe Kisirikko** is a good choice by his friends and colleagues in the interrelated fields of Disability Inclusion and Adult Education. Immediately after the sad news of his death on December 26, 2023, sympathy messages with tributes poured in on several social media platforms. The several tributes that you are about to read in this eulogy celebrate the life of a prominent practitioner and passionate advocate of the principles and values of inclusion and social justice in education and development.

Several individuals testify to the fact that Fred made immense contributions to Uganda's Adult Learning and Education (ALE) practice and policy landscape in several ways. As a writer and co-author, his name features prominently on pages of several resource materials by, for instance, the Ministry of Gender and Labour and Social Development. A couple of testimonies in this eulogy single out his ever loud and clear voice for disability responsive character and format of content. Whether it was about the font size of texts, illustrations, images or speech volume and PowerPoint presentations, Fred would never keep quiet if such were not sensitive and responsive to disabilities such as visual impairments.

It is very clear to many of us who knew Fred that he was a unique human being who was fearless in defending his rights and privileges as a person with disability. The beauty with Fred, was his powerful mind that he used himself as a shining example in defence and promotion of inclusive development. He inspired dozens of people; and the testimonies to this unique quality include Annet Luwambo's tribute who writes that Fred 'touched her life at a tender age'.

It is further clear to us who are close to the theory and practice of ALE that Fred possessed inherent values and principles as a real emancipatory adult educator with the required critical awareness of societal injustices against population groups such as (PWDs). As a practising adult educator, he knew well how to use text and words to name and condemn perpetuation of discrimination through education curriculum, content, pedagogy and resources. It is evident that the Man had a strong belief in the power of education and learning; and at his funeral in Seeta-Namulonge, Wakiso District, his loving children were all praises for their Daddy. They told the mourners that their father was a real champion who always stood firmly on matters of education access to everyone including his adopted dependents. His belief in the power of education for all was tied closely to his belief in everyone's right to access quality education and learning opportunities.

Driven by these beliefs and values, Fred transcended typical community development terrain to become a profound social activist and a passionate campaigner of culture and local languages as instruments for meaningful learning. Those of us who are familiar with Uganda's history of Adult Education policy advocacy networks such as the Uganda Adult Education Network (UGAADEN) and National Adult Education Association of Uganda (NAEAU) will always remember his mark and contribution. I am fully aware that his colleagues and friends in the Disability Movement will always miss Fred. I am aware, he was a visible tower in the struggle for inclusive development and social transformation.

I trust that this Fred Lukabwe Kisirikko eulogy can contribute to individual reflections on the continued relevance of the values and principles of inclusion and social justice in the theory, policy and practice of ALE today and tomorrow. I am grateful to all our ALE friends and colleagues who contributed financial resources to the burial expenses and for the graphic design costs of this eulogy. In a special way, I thank the editorial team comprising Mr. Caesar Kyebakola, Dr. Majanja Zaaly'embikke, Mr. Bakaye Lubega, Prof. Ephraim Lemmy Nuwagaba, Ms. MaryClare Nyirenda Katusabe, and Mr. Anthony Okech.

Daughter's account of Papa's education and career milestones

On December 4, 1959, in Sseeta, Namulonge - Busukuma, Jjajjas Azaaliya Kiyingi Ssebowa and Norah Peresika Nakirigya celebrated the arrival of a bright light into their lives. They named him Fred Lukabwe Kisirikko. However, fate had other plans: a childhood marked not only by innocence, but also by the harsh grip of polio. Despite this, adversity bred resilience, and the challenge produced a man of extraordinary determination. He walked his journey with unwavering support from his loving parents and siblings.

His educational journey began like any other, navigating the walls of Nabalanda Nursery School and later Namulonge Primary School. However, it was at Madera School of the Blind, Iganga, where his path took a profound turn. Here, amidst the whispers of Braille and the melody of learning, he discovered the depths of his potential. Passing with distinction, he embarked on the grand stage of Makerere University in 1984, where he graduated with a B.Arts (Hons) Literature in English, Music, Dance and Drama. The corridors of academia became his stage, where his intellect blossomed and his passion for change ignited. In 1992, he deepened his knowledge with a certificate from YMCA Kampala Group administration, followed by a venture into project planning and management at Makerere University in 1994, in addition to many other short courses.

Armed with knowledge and unwavering determination, he joined the public service. He waged a silent war against inequality at his first workplace, the Ministry of Culture and Community Development (MoCCD), which was later restructured to become the Ministry of Gender Labour and Social Development. Dad, driven by an unwavering commitment to combating marginalisation, became a beacon of empowerment for the disenfranchised. The ministry embodied his mission of amplifying the voices of the voiceless. From his pivotal roles in various professional bodies to his tireless advocacy for disability rights, his legacy of inclusion echoed throughout his endeavours.

On 5 September 1987, love graced his life in the form of Mrs. Harriet Namuli Lukabwe, and together they created a beautiful family tapestry adorned with love and unity. Their children, Esther Namitala Racheal, Ssalongo Ernest Sserunkuuma and Nelissa Nantumbwe Juliet, are the living testament to their shared journey. As true Africans, they welcomed and nurtured many other children, including Jackline Suubi Isingwirwe, the late Tendo Denis Ssebale, Dorothy Nalugya, Rebecca Zawedde, and many other wonderful children and grandchildren. The lineage they cultivated attested to the limitless depths of paternal devotion.

His ambitions to reduce all forms of marginalisation by empowering and training the marginalised, particularly people with disabilities, women, and the illiterate in rural areas, so that they could participate as partners in their countries' development processes, went beyond the scope of public service. He did this through several organisations. He was the Chairman of Ekibiina ky'olulimi oluganda, served on the Building Committee, the Directorate of Engineering and Technical Services, KCCA, the Wakiso District Service Commission, the Ministry of Gender, Labour, and Social Development, Uganda National Association of the Blind, Enhance Abilities Initiatives and he chaired the National Adult Education Association of Uganda, International Theater Institute, among other organisations, lending his voice to the voiceless and his strength to the weak.

Music and musical instruments pulsed through his veins, creating a symphony of passion and purpose. From composing anthems that echoed the heartbeat of unity, such as the Timuna Primary School anthem, 2023, and the Action for Development ACFODE anthem, 2006, to composing, directing, and producing anthems such as the Ekibiina Ky'olulimi Oluganda anthem, 2022; the Rotary Club of Kawempe anthem, 2019; the Christian Men's Fellowship, Namirembe Diocese anthem, 2013; the Older Persons anthem, 2009; and the Literacy anthem, 2000. He was also a member of the team that composed anthems such as the East African Community anthem from 2009 to 2010 and the music and lyrics for the Women's anthem in 1984. His creativity, expertise and love of music led him to write and compose modern songs as well as gospel music, including Yafa ku lwange, Echoes of Christ choir, Wulira okusaba kwange, Joldan crossers, Oli mulungi gyendi, New Moon Choirs, Azuukidde, and Gospel Melodies Choirs. His melodies moved hearts and ignited flames of hope.

Dad was an all-around person who fulfilled the roles of devoted family man, respected community leader, dedicated social/development worker, founding member, resource mobiliser, talented instrumentalist, creative composer, skilled playwright and analyst, passionate musician, and insightful poet. He was an avid religion/church enthusiast, a patriot, an extremely devoted and loyal Muganda, a cultural enthusiast, and a linguist who loved Luganda and languages in general, and he believed that language formed a country "olulimi lye gwanga". In addition, he served on several task force committees.


Despite the magnitude of his accomplishments, he remained grounded in warmth and wisdom. Taata Lukabwe's laughter was infectious, and many sought his counsel. As a devoted patriarch, he relished in the simple joys of family and friendships, cherishing each moment as a priceless gift.

On December 26, 2023, this extraordinary man's candle was extinguished; the world bid him farewell, hearts heavy with sadness but lifted by the memory of his legacy. For though he may have departed from this world, his spirit lives on in our hearts, a guiding light for generations to comea testament to the permanent mark of a remarkable man. Farewell, dear daddy, husband, father, son, brother, uncle, jjajja, friend, mentor, colleague, chairman, Omukungu, counsellor, and confidant; your light will continue to guide us in the days ahead. May your journey be as magnificent as the life you lived.




Fred's National Adult Education Association of Uganda Roots

That is the time we were spending sleepless nights writing manuals to be used by the instructors and then other sets for the adult learners. We traversed the whole country training the adult literacy Instructors, carrying it out with commitment and passion.

I still recall vividly the first time we (Late Lukabwe and I) met in 2000, did not know that you had to have your own vehicle from Bugoma to Kalangala town. So, when we got off the ferry we got stuck. We asked one of the district officials for a lift, (name withheld) who agreed without hesitation and we were so grateful. Little did we know that the officer was going to enjoy his booze until after midnight. So, we sat outside and the mosquitoes feasted on us for supper until some few minutes after midnight when the officer beckoned us to go to Kalangala. We sat behind the pickup truck and it was extremely cold and windy. We arrived in Kalangala very hungry and cold and slept on empty stomachs at Adriko's place.

I am still very grateful because it is Lukabwe who put music in the Literacy Anthem which I composed with the help of Anthony Okech and it was accepted and launched on Literacy Day of 2004, in Kalangala by the Ministry of Gender, Labour and Social services. To me he has been my real brother having worked together and faced many field problems/hurdles as we travelled in and around Uganda for more than forty years. Fred and I composed the anthem for ACFODE and NUDIPU and he was on the lead on the team that composed The East Africa Anthem in Swahili.

We in NAEAU have lost a treasure because he has been an exemplary chairperson. All in all, we in the adult education and lifelong learning fraternity have lost a living encyclopaedia. The same goes for Ab'ekibiina Ky'olulimi Oluganda. May the works of his hands continue to flourish and benefit humankind.

An Icon of Social Development

The late Fred Lukabwe Kisiriko, has been an icon of Social Development whom I can confidently call a "Man of all Seasons". Fred Lukabwe, worked with the Ministry of Gender Labour and Social Development, then called Ministry of Youth Culture and Sports, under the Department of Culture for over a decade. He served diligently until, on his own volition, he decided to retire early to take up other roles which he has done to the satisfaction of everyone. Much as he officially left, he remained very close and worked with the Ministry on many Government programmes including Functional Adult Literacy, programmes for the elderly and Persons with Disabilities, Art and Culture and many other social development programmes.

Fred has been a key partner that one would think he was still a staff of the Ministry. He was on many Task Forces set up by the Ministry for the development of Government Policy documents, Training Manuals such as materials for use in promoting Functional Adult Learning (FAL), plus actively participating in the actual training and implementation of these. Amazingly, Fred has been doing all this ungrudgingly and without putting money first. Indeed, Uganda has lost a resource difficult to find in today's era that has an unjustifiably big number of self-seekers.

On behalf of the Government as a whole, and the Ministry of Gender, Labour and Social Development in particular, I would like to extend our heartfelt condolences to the widow and children of the deceased, as well as the wider social circles or networks he belonged to, for the loss of this very important person. Fred loved his family with a passion and looked after it, notwithstanding his disability. He instilled values and educated all his children using whatever resources at his disposal. He leaves a challenge to many able-bodied persons who have abdicated their family responsibilities especially of parenting and educating their children. Fred Lukabwe has been a strong pillar and resource to the Disability Movement. He served as Board Member on several committees, authored many documents for this Movement and left a glowing legacy that he will be remembered for, long after his departure.

It is reported that Fred died when coming from watching a play at Bat Valley Theatre. He was an accomplished artist and perceived and treated Art as a calling. He was a Musician, Composer, Dramatist and Instrumentalist. Fred could sing, play the drums, play the piano, act in plays, direct, critique and adjudicate performances. Fred was one of the three Music Experts that represented Uganda on the Regional Technical Committee that composed the East African Anthem. Just before his demise, he has been working on the Disability Anthem which he pushed so much to have completed and launched this year in November 2023. This was not possible. It is obvious, however, that God gave Lukabwe so many talents which he put to the service of humanity. The fraternity of Artists and the Creatives have indeed lost a very resourceful person.

Allow me also to extend our condolences to the Buganda Kingdom because Fred Lukabwe was a true Muganda who loved his culture, his Kabaka, and his Luganda language. No wonder he has been the Chairperson of "Ekibiina Ky'olulimi Oluganda" in the Kingdom. He knew Luganda and was always eager and happy to teach it to others on radios, in schools and everywhere he could find opportunity.

We condole with the Church where Lukabwe was not only a devout Christian but also a leader and teacher, who loved and practised his faith. He served God and his Church with love and devotion and we believe God will give Fred a befitting reward for his endless good works on earth.

The Legacy of Fred Lukabwe in ULALA

It was of great sorrow to learn about the demise of Fred Lukabwe Kisirikko, our dearest friend, mentor, educator, adviser and Godfather. As ULALA, we have worked with Fred since our inception. We had immense achievements and milestones with his help over decades.

Many of us as adult learners, wouldn't have taken the opportunity to learn and also improve our statuses. Fred motivated and encouraged many of us to start learning and he was our mentor. With his mentorship, we have been able to mentor many other learners. He personally organised and led in training us on different skills like Leadership, Lobbying and Advocacy at different levels as well as fundraising. These skills have been very important in building ULALA and we take pride in his voluntary efforts.

Fred found us very stuck regarding the registration of ULALA to become a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO). He provided technical assistance in this process. ULALA got registered and it is operating to-date. Professionally, he supported ULALA in translating the Adult Learners Guide into Luganda. This simplified a lot of work for the learners thus improving the teaching and learning experience.

Fred connected us to different donors and more specifically the British Council which funded us on some activities and through the same project I was personally funded for a study tour in the UK and this couldn't happen without him. He did a great job in building capacity for different literacy instructors/facilitators across the country and this helped us as ULALA to extend our services beyond Kampala, thus reaching out to many other adult literacy learners.

As Adult learners, Fred did a lot of work in advocacy to make sure that adult learning in Uganda is improved and taken as a very important matter. We worked with him in ensuring that the Adult Literacy Policy is developed and enacted into a law. Unfortunately, he left when the job was not yet completed but ULALA is so proud of his contributions to this cause. Surely, he left a very strong foundation in this. Generally, all his contributions to ULALA and the general Adult Learners" fraternity cannot be put down on paper. We are grateful for the legacy he left with us.


